It is literally the "last place" in any alphabetical listing. It is also the last stop on our Amateur Radio GPS Mystery Tour.

#### It's APRS April!

HIS MONTH, the Parasitic Emission features articles about APRS—what is is, how to use it, why you need it. APRS stands for "Amateur Packet Reporting System" and is sort-of a step-child of packet radio. Although it uses some of the same equipment and protocols of packet, you don't need a computer plugged into your radio to benefit from using APRS. You don't need to be a computer whiz either—most of the APRS radios on the market are plug and play, allowing you to start APRS-ing in a matter of minutes.



Some people use APRS for position reporting, and following other hams' daily journeys on a map can be a lot of fun (for a while). But the real value of APRS is much more than that. Amateur Radio is all about communicating information, and at that APRS excels. When it comes to getting a picture of amateur radio activity in a local area, APRS really fills the bill. For instance, travelers will receive periodic bulletins about the best local repeater to use, and with the push of a button on their radio tune it in with the correct offset and access tone. See the information, push a button and talk on the mic—it's that easy!

When bad weather is on the way, APRS comes alive with storm warnings that give the distance and direction to the weather, all which pops up on your radio's screen. Your fellow hams may use APRS to make SKYWARN

reports available to you at the same time they are made available to the National Weather Service. This is information you can use immediately, and doesn't need an Internet connection or paid subscription service.

Other objects can direct you to local activities, such as nets, VE Exams, club meetings, hamfests, club activities, Field Day sites and much more. Each one can have its talk-in frequency posted and—you guessed it —you can push that "TUNE" or "QSY" button to be magically transported to the right frequency with the correct access tones! Each of these objects includes its GPS coordinates and if you're using a GPS you can navigate to that object's location!

Of course you can use APRS for tracking other hams, too. For example, you see that your old pal Floyd is out and about when his beacon pops up on your radio screen. Not only can you see that his radio is tuned to 146.52 simplex, you can push your "QSY" button and give him a call. Or better still, you can send a text message to good ole W3LID by pushing the message button, and typing a short greeting using the number pad of your microphone. (Please don't do this while driving!) With your connected GPS, you can navigate to his position and have an eyeball QSO, without tying up a repeater with directions.

#### Emcomm Uses

All of these capabilities can be very useful for emergency communications. At the EOC, for example, a computer can be connected to an APRS radio to present a real-time local map of where each emcomm unit is located. Each station's speed, direction of travel and voice frequency are constantly displayed and updated, making it very easy to get in touch with them as needed. If a mobile amateur station has been dispatched to a shelter, and Amateur Radio is all about communicating information, and APRS excels

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the shelter is equipped with an APRS station, the shelter can follow the mobile station's progress, and provide special information such as highway conditions via a text message to the mobile operator.

Back at the EOC, the same information is available on the screen, too, thus providing the very important "Common Picture" which enables all responders and incident commanders to do their jobs better.

APRS is not brand new technology, but it is very up-to-date. The reason that statement is not a contradiction is because APRS is an evolving system. It is under continuous improvement, and its development is done by amateurs who are actually using the technology. As new needs arise, these clever amateurs figure out how to meet them, and pass along their solutions to everyone else. The original APRS protocols have been long since abandoned, and new "paradigms" have taken their place. This flexibility has given APRS (and by extension, packet radio) an new lease on life. Both are here to stay.

The necessary equipment need not be expensive-in fact you can assemble your own from used equipment and free software. I built my first APRS rig that way for a cash outlay of around \$20 for connectors and a box for portability. That rig used a 10 year old laptop, a 10 year old GPS and a 20 year old 2meter handheld transceiver. Another \$25 at a hamfest got me a 40-watt amplifier which made a huge improvement in the coverage. If you want to go this route, you can find a good, used GPS for around \$20, a handheld with amplifier or a mobile 2-meter rig that will do the job will set you back about \$50-\$75, and an old laptop can be found at a yard sale for \$30-\$40, making the total cost well under \$150.

There are kits you can build, too, ranging in

price from \$25 to \$200, depending on how many bells and whistles you want to have. If brand new is your style, there are several fullfeatured APRS radios on the market. Top of the line units cost about \$500 to \$600, and handheld models go for \$400 to \$500. Used models are available from the usual places for a lot less, and you can find some real bargains if you shop around.

If you have some spare Internet bandwidth and a few spare dollars, you can connect that old radio and computer together and provide a real service to amateurs in your area. The northernmost reaches of the *Parasitic Emission's* circulation area are in need of fill-in digipeaters and "Igates." You can put your old computer and radio back into service to operate as both a fill-in digi and Igate, pretty much at no cost.

It's comparatively easy to set up a valuable APRS station, but it's also pretty easy to make a mistake and cripple the APRS infrastructure over a wide area! If you're not an old pro, you probably should check with other local APRS users to get their input and help. As of this writing, a look at the coverage map indicates the need for a couple of Igates along the northern tier of counties, and digis along US 6 would expand the coverage outward from the sea of yellow in the middle. Indiana County would really benefit from a high-level digi on Pike's Peak or Chestnut Ridge near Blairsville.

Rumor has it that there is a proposed high-Level digipeater in the Emporium area atop Whittimore Hill. That is an excellent location, and will fill in a massive gap in coverage that currently exists! Bill Edgar, N3LLR has recently launched a Digi near Bradford and plans to make it a High-Level digi to cover a good portion of the northern counties.

#### Settings

Here is a simple guide to the path settings

you should use.

Station	UNPROTO Path
Mobile / HT	WIDE1-1,WIDE2-2
Fill-In Digipeater	WIDE2-1
High-Level Digi	(blank)
IGate	WIDE1-1

Note that WIDE3-3, WIDE4-4 or higher is not necessary, and is unwelcome on the East Coast. The (ab)use of the WIDE settings will not get you any benefit, and in many cases will actually get you a shorter path (like to the bit-bucket!)

Fixed APRS stations are encouraged to include a "PHG" descriptor after their latitude and longitude. That stands for "Power, Height and Gain." There is a lot of confusion surrounding this, especially the height. It is NOT the elevation above sea level. It is also NOT the height of the tower. It is what the FCC calls "Height Above Average Terrain" or HAAT. It is difficult to calculate by hand, but computer programs have made it considerably easier. Here is a chart of local digipeaters I know of, and the correct PHG. (I'm assuming the P and the G are correct.)

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#### Learning more

At the Quad-County ARC Meeting, April 15<sup>th</sup>, there will be an interesting program on using APRS presented by Centre County ARES **Emegency Coordinator Carmine Prestia** K3CWP and Woody Brem K3YV. They have been using APRS for local Public Service activities for the past several years and will share their experience with us.

I plan on bringing my homebrew APRS rig, as well as my Kenwood D710. WA3UFN hopes to have his Yaesu FT350R on display as well. Bob Bruninga WB4APR (the inventor of APRS) has shared a short slideshow about the

current state of APRS, which we'll show during the presentation.

Finally, the International Space Station will be passing overhead around 9:00 pm, and we will try to extablish APRS contact through the onboard APRS digipeater if it's in operation.

### Final Thoughts

APRS is a technology that permits exchanging information digitally over an analog voice frequency. The cost of the equipment is lowin fact it is fully compatible with your existing investment in two meter FM equipment.

Infrastructure such as digis and Igates will

enhance the usefulness of APRS, but it functions very well with no connection other than simplex, radio-to-radio. Even at its most basic level, the network builds itself automatically and information spreads far and wide, allowing anyone to get a good picture of local amateur radio information in 30 minutes or less.

The main strength of APRS in an emergency situation is the fact that it works without needing any infrastructure. Additionally, in an emergency, any two-way APRS installation can be quickly configured as a digipeater, and set up at a moment's notice if needed.



# Tactical, Real-Time APRS Bob Bruninga, WB4APR

APRS is billed as a situational awareness service, yet the map is largely barren of situational awareness information. I ask myself "why?"

**OOD QUESTION!...** In the middle years as APRS grew in user size, it seemed to diminish every year from its original intent as a tactical real time information resource and fast 2-way communications system to nothing but a vehicle tracking system in many people's eyes. Its time to re-open their eyes!

APRS is not about vehicle tracking. It is a single information resource channel where everything that is going on in ham radio in the surrounding area can be announced and updated in real time. It presents to the viewer on his APRS radio front panel all that is happening right now, where it is, and all the info he needs to participate whether it is an event, happening, net, activity, announcement, future activity, or situation. The APRS channel is his one-stop look at everything that could be going on in the local area, and his one-stop place to post what he might be doing that might be of interest to others. APRS is not about GPS positions, it is about a situational map display of everything that is happening, and most of that is OBJECTS containing INFO on the activty and how to contact other operators. Here are some local info examples to the mobile:





These objects inform visitors or travelers (from left to right), the locally recommended voice repeater (and tone) and the local Echolink and IRLP nodes and other info of local interest to help the traveler join in on local operations. In the D710, these nearby objects can be sorted by distance, type, alphabetically, and time.

#### APRS is not about dumb-one-way-trackers

APRS was designed for the manual and automatic entry and management of large numbers of on-screen objects that would be a major function of the display of local information. Further, Bulletins and Announcements would keep everyone informed of the SAME information at the SAME time. Operator Messages would communicate important information in the background without encumbering voice nets. And finally, that all mobiles would have simple displays to keep them in communications and aware of their surroundings. These images show an APRS message (in this case an email):



#### **MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT APRS:**

The following misconceptions may be what is keeping some amateur radio operators from using APRS to its full potential:

- Misconception that P stands for Position transmission instead of PACKET reception.
- Misconception that APRS is just a

Vehicle Tracking System instead of a Real-Time Information Distribution System.

- Misconception that APRS is dependent on GPS for its value (It is not. See Objects).
- Failure to use the APRS built-in Mile-Marks for tracking all other non-APRS non-GPS mobiles.
- Using APRS clients that only focus on maps and vehicles and ignored too many of the APRS NETWORK fundamentals.
- Failure to understand that APRS is all about OBJECTS.
- Failure to use real-time messaging: .
- Failure to implement the original APRS Centralized Common Bulletin Board concept.
- Failure to recognize that the D7, D700 and FTM-350 make exellent data entry and clipboard display units at any field event.
- Failure to understand how to best use APRS Displays in support of real-time events.
- Failure to display APRS symbols with all their attributes visible to all viewers not just those that click on them.
- Failure to manage the local APRS network by adjusting the local digipeater for the situation at hand.
- Not realizing that Voice Operating frequencies are as important as any other parameter in APRS.
- No one in your area is running any of the APRS Satellite engines such as

The APRS channel is a one-stop look at everything going on in the local area

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APRSdata or DIGI\_NED that send out minute-by-minute location info on any AMSATs that are in view. These satellite objects show up on the front panel of the radio by name, with the present uplink and downlink frequencies and present doppler so all you need do is press a button and your radio can tune to the satellite in real time. See Satellite Bulletins and Objects about 60% down the ASTARS page. You don't need any satellite tracking program. The info comes in on your APRS radio display.

The photo below shows a typical APRS set up

in the field at an event. . This station can be

used to not only show other personnel at the

checkpoint the tactical situation, but it keeps

the APRS operator at this site informed...

It does this while not requiring his immediate and constant attention except when he needs access to the info. His laptop has been doing

the radio monitoring for him so that he does not need to keep his ear tuned to all the chatter on the voice net. . If he needs up-to-date info, he does not have to request it from the voice net, but just views the latest on his APRS displays when he needs it.

ALL Information: In other words, the information on APRS is not just the location of vehicles, but all announcements, bulletins, messages, status, lists of info, locations of assets and personnel and objects, References, phone numbers, links, tables, whatever... If it has anything to do with the event, it should be on APRS,

of the activities on the various nets and enter this situational information into their APRS PC's and all this data would show everywhere



updated in real time, and available to all on demand.

Other Data Entry Stations: But we should not lose sight of the home station that can also be used as a great information resource. The next photo shows a station that was set up in a motel room and the operators there could monitor all on APRS. . AND through the miracle of wireless (ham radio) they do not have to be at the site. . They do NOT need GPS and they can be anywhere convenient, just monitoring, and inputing and managing the data (that appears everywhere).

**REMEMBER:** If you are not using the full potential of APRS, it is not the fault of the protocol or the hardware. APRS is a communication tool, not just an automated map. Use it. But in most cases, that means ENTERING DATA, not just watching it. Also, even if you do not use APRS personally, make sure that your local area, club or organization supports a packet digipeater on 144.39 for those travelers that transit your area. They depend on you for their connectivity, and local info, and may join your activities. APRS is a communication tool, not just an automated map.
