AUXCOM COMMUNICATIONS: WHERE DO YOU FIT IN?



If the term is unfamiliar to you please step back and take a deep breath. Actually, it has been around for a few years but not readily known in Kentucky to all amateurs. There has been a few classes given in Kentucky, just recently in Jefferson Co and a

previous one in Hopkinsville and Northern KY. How does it affect you the Ham Radio Operator? It all depends on whether you want to participate with served agencies. It depends on whether you have completed the much talked about NIMS courses, 100, 200, 700, 800 and a licensed amateur radio operator. Let's face it, when the big one hits in Western KY in the New Madrid fault area and you want to try out that new HT and you want to help your county or district, forget it unless you have documented training, unless you operate from house.

What is Auxcomm? AUXCOMM" is an umbrella term and acronym for "auxiliary communications." ...AUXCOMM, although not an official national ICS position as of yet, is most often identified as a Technical Specialist (THSP) in the Communications Unit of the NIMS ICS structure.

All the states surrounding KY are on board and we too must jump on board. Yes, it will be a learning experience, using new terms, forms etc. However, this is how the game is played in a large scale event. We must move forward. There will opportunities coming in several different regions around the state. Do you want to participate? The minimum class size is 15. Contact your ASEC now if you want on board.

There is a wealth of information for all regardless of the level you see yourself. KYHAM <u>KY Encomm</u> <u>Training</u> provides an excellent source of information for ARES in several courses, plus ARRL provides courses in emergency communications along with the online NIMS courses: <u>FEMA NIMS TRAINING</u> <u>COURSES</u> Many folks in Kentucky are already on this bandwagon. What about you? You are very much needed.

Now what am I suppose to do with this radiogram? Taking the step for final delivery, ok its not pizza but about as good!

Delivering traffic takes skill and practice. After you receive your traffic from one of the nets you need to deliver your traffic to the recipient. The first thing to do when making the call is to introduce yourself as a ham radio operator. By doing this, first off you will let them know you

are not trying to sell them something. You need to talk to the addressee, you may ask when a good time to call back is. If you get an answering machine, leave your name and phone number and that you will try calling back. When you deliver your message only read the text and signature. Be sure to read the text for an ARL numbered radiogram. If you tried to deliver your message three times with no luck, just send a send a service message to the originator. All in all it is not hard to deliver traffic, but sometimes the first one is a little daunting. Give it a try
