All members of the Bluegrass Amateur Radio Society, Inc., pass along our deepest sympathy to Wilson's widow Betty and his family. We cannot stress how we all will miss his help with our Club administration and his wise council. Included here is Wilson's obituary as it was published in our local newspaper, Herald-Leader, and by the Amateur Radio journal "QST."

WELLS Wilson L., Jr., 93, passed away August 11, 2018, surrounded by members of his family. He was an RN, Red Cross volunteer, ham radio enthusiast (N4ZQT), American Legionnaire, and Veterans Affairs volunteer. He was retired from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

As a Bluegrass Red Cross volunteer for decades Wilson worked in disaster recovery from fires, floods, tornadoes, and hurricanes in Alabama, Arkansas, California, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Texas, West Virginia, and the Virgin Islands and Guam. He enjoyed the people he met while living under tarps and sharing meals, providing critical health care, food, shelter, and other support to families in crisis. Wilson's parents, Wilson, Sr., and Lois Wells, sister and cousins spent summers at their Minnesota lake place fishing, swimming, clearing land, building cabins, and tapping maple trees to make syrup.

Throughout his lifetime, as his career took him to many towns across the country, he returned to the family cabin as do his family, now six generations. Wilson will be missed by his family: wife, Betty, her children, Joan and Michael; his children, Mary, Stephen, and Tommy; their spouses, children, and grandchildren; and many beloved cousins, nieces, nephews, and friends in Kentucky, Minnesota, and England. Wilson was buried at Ft. Snelling National Cemetery in Minneapolis, a memorial gathering will be held next summer

First FT8 Roundup is a Huge Hit

12/13/2018

The first FT8 Roundup over the December 1 - 2 weekend **attracted** some 1,300 logs from those taking advantage of the ever-more-popular digital protocol. This, despite its having been announced on fairly short notice and with other contests such as the ARRL 160-Meter Contest under way on the same weekend. More than 400 logs were from US radio amateurs in the 48 contiguous states, plus the District of Columbia. Overall, some 131,200 contacts were recorded. Participants from 91 countries submitted logs, testifying to the fact that FT8 is not just an US phenomenon.

"The FT8 Roundup was the last shakedown for the *WSJT-X* 2.0-rc5 beta software," said well-known RTTY contesting enthusiast and expert Don Hill, AA5AU, an FT8 Roundup cosponsor with Ed Muns, W0YK. "It performed with no major complications." The general availability release of *WSJT-X* 2.0 is now out, and it's not backward compatible with *WSJT-X* 1.9 or earlier versions. Developer Joe Taylor, K1JT, has urged users to upgrade by January 1 to what now is new world standard. Muns, who's <u>*NCJ*</u> "Digital Contesting" contributing editor, said FT8 Roundup participation compared favorably with that for the ARRL RTTY Roundup, which has averaged around 1,700 logs in recent years.

"Don and I expected the contest to be popular," Muns said, "but the participation far exceeded our expectations. I think it bodes well for future FT8 contesting. Don and I are pretty bullish about continuing the FT8 Roundup on the first full weekend of December each year." Nonetheless, Muns said he doesn't believe FT8 will "really take off" and displace RTTY until the contact rate can be significantly increased through parallel QSO techniques.

Hill agreed on the event's popularity. "I have to say it was a huge success," he said. "Ed and I never dreamed it would be this popular. It didn't make sense to continue the Ten-Meter RTTY Contest during this part of the sunspot cycle. Replacing it with an all-FT8 HF contest was the logical choice." Hill and Muns also co-sponsor the Ten-Meter RTTY Contest.

Hill told ARRL that final results of the inaugural FT8 Roundup should be out in a few days. "After the New Year, we hope to have downloadable online certificates available to all participants. We will definitely do it again next year," he said.

The 2019 **ARRL RTTY Roundup** will permit the use of FT8. From ARRL Letter 12/13/18
